






Higher Ed Enrollment Cliff






One-in-five enrolled students is Latinx/e

Background

- 3.4 million Latinx/e undergraduate students were enrolled in a postsecondary institution in 2020-21
- 80% of Latinx/e students enrolled at a public institution almost half at a public 4-year and 36% at a public 2-year
- Latinx/e students are more likely to enroll part-time than all students



Background

- Between fall 2009 and fall 2019, total college enrollment decreased by 5%, but Latinx/e student college enrollment increased by 48%
- Latinx/e enrollment fell by 7% between fall 2019 and fall
 2021, citing challenges with the pandemic
- Number of Hispanic Serving Institutions those with at least 25% Latinx/e population - also fell during the pandemic




LATINX/E STUDENTS IN VIRGINIA

Statistics

- The national Hispanic population grew 23% since the last census, making up half of the total population growth nationwide
- Virginia's Latinx population grew significantly faster: a 44% increase over ten years
- Loudoun County
 - Latinx population increased by 55% for a total of 14%, from
 2010 to 2020
- Most institutions have prioritized Latinx recruitment and outreach through programming and additional funding





Population by County








